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WIAA ANNOUNCES 2009 SCHOLAR ATHLETE AWARD WINNERS

STEVENS POINT, Wis. – Thirty-two senior students attending Wisconsin public and nonpublic high schools have been named winners of the 2009 WIAA Scholar Athlete Award, presented by the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association.

That brings to 764 the number of young men and women honored since the program was launched in 1984 to honor scholastic and athletic excellence.

This year's 16 boys and 16 girls will be recognized at an award ceremony Sunday, May 3, in Wausau. Featured speaker will be Douglas Chickering, the retiring executive director of the WIAA. An educator for 45 years and head of the WIAA since 1986, Chickering will retire on July 31. He has been involved with the Scholar Athlete program since it was launched in 1984.

The WIAA Scholar Athlete Award program has been underwritten since its inception by Liberty Mutual Group, which will host the awards ceremony at the Westwood Conference Center in Wausau.

Every year, each of the WIAA-member high schools in the state is invited to nominate one boy and one girl for Scholar Athlete honors. There were 707 nominations – 351 boys and 356 girls – for the 2009 statewide award from 376 schools. The school and nomination totals are record figures. The following is a list of the 2009 winners, the communities in which they live and the high schools they attend.

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To qualify for the WIAA Scholar Athlete Award, a nominee must have earned at least four varsity letters through the first half of his/her senior year and must have a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 scale. This year's nominees in four WIAA categories included 178 from 94 schools in Division 1; 180 from 97 schools in Division 2; 193 from 105 schools in Division 3; and 153 from 80 schools in Division 4. The divisions are those used by the WIAA for basketball and volleyball tournament participation.

At the May 3rd awards ceremony, at which the winners' parents and coaches or teachers will also be guests, each 2009 WIAA Scholar Athlete will receive a medallion and certificate, and will take with them a special plaque for display in their school's trophy case.
