Board of Control Approves Spring Sport Rules Changes, Fall Co-ops

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control approved coaches advisory committee rule change recommendations in softball, lacrosse and track & field at its Oct. 31 meeting.

Beginning in June 2025, the State Softball Tournament will expand to a four-day format to address early start times and the time-constraint concerns of conducting seven games in a single day. The revised State Tournament schedule will begin Wednesday and run through Saturday. The Division 1 quarterfinals will be conducted Wednesday. Thursday's schedule will feature the Division 5 and Division 4 semifinals followed by one Division 1 semifinal. The other Division 1 semifinal will be played Friday morning with Division 3 and Division 2 semifinals to follow. Saturday's schedule of championship games will remain unchanged.

In track & field, the State Meet list of qualifiers will be expanded beginning next spring. The Board approved a recommendation to increase the number of extra qualifiers from eight to 10 in all events with the related increase in qualifying medals. As indicated in the Season Regulations, extra qualifiers will include individuals and relay teams with marks or times that rank in the top 10 performances of all sectionals combined.

The Board supported one recommendation in lacrosse. Beginning next spring, the highest-seeded team will host the sectional final, but if the higher seed is unable to host, the game will be moved to a neutral site.

There were five conference realignment fast track plans approved by the Board, effective in 2025-26. Chetek-Weyerhaeuser exits the Heart O' North Conference and enters the Dunn-St. Croix for all sports except football. Unity will move from the Lakeland Conference to the Heart O' North. Stevens Point Area Senior High School girls hockey will enter the new Northern Girls Hockey Conference from the Eastern Girls Hockey Conference. Participation in High School Sports Tops Eight Million for First Time in 2023-24

More than eight million participants competed in high school sports in the 2023-24

school year – an all-time record and the first time ever that total participation has exceeded the eight-million mark.



The NFHS High School Athletics Participation Survey indicated that 8,062,302 participants were involved in high school sports in 2023-24, which is up 210,469 from the previous year and tops the previous record of 7,980,886 set in 2017-18. The total includes 4,638,785 boys and 3,423,517 girls – both record highs – according to figures obtained *See Participation, page 4* >

Board Approves Association Handbooks, Lacrosse Realignment Fast Track

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control approved a limited number of action items, and received customary executive staff and liaison reports at its Sept. 20 meeting.

Bryan Davis, superintendent of the Oshkosh Area School District, was introduced as the new District 4 representative on the Board replacing Dan Retzki, who announced his resignation from the Board in August after accepting a principal position at a member school outside the district.

The Board voted to authorize the additions, edits and content of association publications, including the 2024-25 handbooks for the Board of Control, Executive Staff, Classification Committee and other committees, and Conference Realignment. In addition, the Board approved 2024-25 appointments to the Conference Realignment Task Force, Sports Medical Advisory Committee, Classification Committee and Coaches Advisory committees.

A conference realignment fast track recommendation that merges the Fox River Classic and Fox River Valley Conference for lacrosse was approved by the Board. The nine-team league will include Appleton East/Appleton North/Appleton West/Fox Valley Lutheran/Hortonville/Ripon/Waupaca/Wild Rose/Xavier Co-op, Bay Port, De Pere/West De Pere Co-op, Neenah, Kimberly, Notre Dame/Ashwaubenon/Freedom/Kaukauna Co-op, Oneida Nation/Green Bay East/Green Bay Preble/Green Bay Southwest/Green Bay West/Seymour Co-op, Pulaski and Wausau West/D.C. Everest/Mosinee/Wausau East Co-op.

Other Board action included approval of the regular monthly financial statements and general fund payments, as well as the moving of April 2025 Board meeting to Wednesday, April 23.

Additional topics of discussion included staff reports on continued efforts to recruit and retain licensed officials, 2024-25 membership renewals, preparations for the fall Tournament Series and a report reviewing the first three Area Meetings.

The Board also received liaison reports from Paul Manriquez of the Department of Public Instruction, Dan Rossmiller of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards, Brittany Spencer Grant of the Wisconsin Athletic Directors Association. Andy Engel of the Hamilton Consulting Group and Melinda Koski of Platform Communications also presented reports to the Board.

WIAA Seeks Nominations for Spirit of Sport Award

The WIAA Executive Staff is encouraging all member schools to submit nominations of individuals or groups they consider worthy of consideration for the 2024-25 National Federation of State High School Associations Spirit of Sport Award.

The deadline for nominating an individual or group for the award sponsored by the Dairy Farmers of Wisconsin is Friday, December 6th. Please submit the name and a brief summary of the nominee to Melissa Gehring at mgehring@wiaawi.org. If your nominee is chosen for the award, administrators will be asked to complete a more comprehensive application to be forwarded to the NFHS for consideration.

This award seeks to recognize those individuals who exemplify the ideals of the positive spirit of sport that represent the core mission of education-based athletics. It honors an individual or group that has overcome significant adversity or challenging circumstances, has exceeded normal expectations in assisting others within the school or community, or has demonstrated exemplary sportsmanship and/or citizenship in playing the game as it should be played.

The award may be given in recognition of a specific act or for an activity of longer duration. Nominees may include student-athletes, coaches, athletic administrators, school administrators, contest officials, athletic trainers, community and booster club members, or anyone associated with a school's athletic program.

The Wisconsin nominee is submitted to the NFHS for national consideration. Each year, the NFHS presents eight section recipients, as well as a national recipient for the Spirit of Sport Award. The WIAA's nominee to the NFHS will receive a keepsake award in recognition of the honor and be introduced at the WIAA Annual Meeting on April 25, 2025.

The National High School Spirit of Sport Award began in 2008 with the WIAA's recognition of Wisconsin's nomination and finalists beginning in 2017-18.

Past recipients of Wisconsin's Spirit of Sport Award include Bryce Ladwig of Plymouth High School in 2017-18, who was also selected as the NFHS Section 4 recipient; Ashley Stich of Kenosha Tremper High School in 2018-19, Adam Szepieniec of DeForest High School in 2019-20, Abby Tuma of Shawano in 2020-21, Jordan Glenn of Wisconsin Lutheran in 2021-22, and Kenzie Koppenhaver of Kiel in 2022-23 and Michael Turner of Hartford in 2023-24. ●

Membership, Staff Engage in Valuable Interaction

The WIAA Executive Staff traveled the 2024 circuit of seven district Area Meetings in September, marking the 48th year the meetings have been conducted.

Two of the informative agenda topics featured presentations from members of the Student-Athlete Leadership Team and the Calendar & Contact Committee.

Student-athletes representing schools in their respective districts expressed their insights on why they were interested in serving on the team, and they conveyed three goals for SALT in the group's first year. The goals included addressing student-athlete mental health, increasing the number of licensed officials through recruitment and promoting good sportsmanship, and enhancing school spirit and athletic participation.

School representatives serving on the Calendar & Contact Committee communicated the group's purpose statement and provided a progress update and data collected on the study of season lengths, game maximums, and coaching contact days. The committee members announced the prioritization of coaching contact days as its first area of study, and they encouraged the membership's assistance in gathering data through a diverse, statewide survey.

Executive staff presentations encompassed a brief history, timeline and current status of the basketball shot clock with a governance structure overview, an update on the implementation of the competitive balance performance factor, a review of the 2024 Constitutional changes and a summary of the potential 2025 Constitutional amendments, including another consideration of Name, Image and Likeness language.

WIAA Sport Medical Advisory Committee

The History

In mid-1930, the WIAA Board of Control established the WIAA Benefit Plan to be overseen by the WIAA Secretary Neverman. "The WIAA also procured the services of a medical advisor for the Benefit Plan. The first such person was Dr. M. D. Bird of Marinette. He received a \$100 honorarium for his first year's work of reviewing unusual injury claims." (Otte, More Than A Game, 1996, 120)

With the creation of the WIAA Benefit Plan, the WIAA established days-out limitations on athlete injuries and determined a required recovery period. In fact, the WIAA Benefit Plan limited the return to play from a major head injury (concussion) to one calendar year and the return to play from a minor head injury to 30 days.

The WIAA Sport Medical Advisory Committee (SMAC) was established in 1974 to replace the State Medical Society's Subcommittee on WIAA matters because the latter group "has only one practicing physician involved in athletics." (Otte, 377) In 1975, the Committee met for the first time. The WIAA was among the first high school state associations in the country to develop a Sport Medical Advisory Committee.

Significant Health Moves

The WIAA Medical Policies and Procedures Manual was distributed to the WIAA membership in 1975 and revamped for the 1990-91 school year. The publication provides guidelines on many medical matters for interscholastic athletic practices and contests. It currently is updated annually it is available on the WIAA website.

The Sport Medical Advisory Committee established the Wrestling 7% Committee, now the Minimum Weight Committee, in 1989 and in 1990; the Minimum Weight Committee recommended the skinfold measurement system for all wrestlers to determine a minimum wrestling weight. The program became mandatory in 1991. (Otte, 432) Later in 1996, the Minimum Weight Committee recommended a hydration test to work along with the skinfold measurement process.

2024-25 Officials Recruitment and Retainment

Annual Registration Windows for Officials

The WIAA offers three registration windows for officials. We have recently completed a window for officials to register without incurring a \$30 processing fee. That window was available from September 15-30 and we saw approximately 862 officials register during this 15-day window for a total of 1,365 sport registrations, that's 1.58 sports per official.

The final registration window remaining for this school year is: January 1-15 Member Schools Lending a Hand

Member schools have contributed to the recruitment of new officials in many ways, including providing high school classes on officiating. We have seen the involvement of high schools grow exponentially over the past 3 years

Last year, the number of WIAA-licensed officials reached 10,181. The highest total in the association's history. This marks a significant recovery after the COVID-19 pandemic drastically reduced the pool of available officials. A key factor in this resurgence has been the substantial increase in high school students becoming licensed, which has greatly contributed to the overall numbers. We are excited to track the future success of these efforts.

While these students may not yet be ready for officiating at the varsity level, they represent the future of officiating in Wisconsin. It is essential that we actively support and nurture them on this journey, while making a conscious effort to shield them from the negativity that has driven many officials away from the profession.

We are also grateful to the many individuals and groups across the state who are playing an active role in recruiting new officials. Let's continue working together to promote sportsmanship and positive interactions with the officials who serve our schools and communities. \bullet

2024-25 WIAA Wrestling Points of Emphasis and Reminders

We would like to remind all officials and coaches that there will be an officials' clinic held in conjunction with the coaches' clinic on Nov. 9th in Wisconsin Dells. Our major goal is to have uniform officiating state wide. Coaches are welcome to attend. It is important for all officials to go to the website and check your profile to make sure it is accurate and current. Failure to do so could result in your being ineligible for some post season assignments. Be certain to complete your exam(s) and preseason video this fall – this is a requirement for coaches and is important for officials to maintain/advance their classification level.

Our Need for Officials

We all realize that Wisconsin is in dire need of young officials. As in the past, I encourage all officials' associations state wide to adopt a mentoring program to help develop young officials. In addition, all high school coaches should encourage their athletes to consider obtaining a limited-restricted license. This will allow them to officiate all youth through JV level wrestling events. There is no fee to be paid by them for this license.

Officials' Clinic

Will again be held in Wisconsin Dells on Nov. 9th in conjunction with the annual WWCA coach's clinic. This is a great event – be there if possible. You will be contacted with more information. Association leaders, please encourage your membership to attend.

Coaching Corners

With the rule change this year to include only one point of contact to have wrestlers considered inbounds, we are strongly encouraging that all tournament directors consider keeping the coaching corners off of the mat itself. Doing this will provide the full mat area to be utilized and provide the safest set up for the athletes and coaches. If the coaches area is on the mat and a wrestler comes in contact with that area, they will be considered

NAERA Football Helmet Reconditioning and Recertification Recommendations

NAERA (National Athletic Equipment Reconditioners Association), NOCSAE (National Operating Committee on Standards for Athletic Equipment) and helmet manufacturers are informing you of reconditioning and recertification recommendations for football, lacrosse, baseball and softball helmets.

NAERA recommends that during every football, lacrosse, baseball and softball season or practice period, every helmet should be cleaned and inspected regularly by a school or organization staff member with knowledge of manufacturer recommendations. We further recommend every helmet should be reconditioned and recertified annually unless stated otherwise by the manufacturer. ONLY a company licensed by NOCSAE can perform the recertification of football, lacrosse, baseball and softball helmets. For a list of NAERA members that are licensed by NOCSAE please visit our web site www.naera.net. More information regarding NOCSAE and their standards can be found at www.nocsae.org.

Reconditioning/Recertification and Sanitization Post Covid-19: NAERA recommends every football, lacrosse, baseball and softball helmet be reconditioned and recertified prior to being issued to all athletes, unless stated otherwise by the manufacturer. NAERA further recommends that nonrecertifiable equipment, including but not limited to, football and lacrosse shoulder pads, chest protectors and shin guards be sanitized in accordance to manufacturer guidelines.

On January 1, 2017 NOCSAE put into effect standard ND 001 6.1.1 shown below.

ND 001 6.1.1. Helmets intended to be recertified shall have a recertification interval provided by the manufacturer. Certification life is limited to this time period. Helmets not recertified during the stated interval shall no longer be certified. Recertification interval required for warranty validation shall satisfy this requirement. What does ND 001 6.1.1 mean for your school or organization? For Football helmets, as of this writing, the requirements from all football helmet manufacturers for recertification is a *minimum* of every other year. If you acquired new helmets in 2020 these helmets will need recertification per this standard for 2024 play.

Helmets that have a lapsed certification per NOCSAE DOC. 001 may be recertified under most conditions. Always ask your NAERA representative if you have doubts. **Remember when your team Captain or Coach tells the official your team is legally equipped, you need to know that is correct and factual.**

Every state association playing under NFHS (National Federation of State High School Associations) and NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) rules has adopted the NOCSAE standards for football, lacrosse, baseball and softball helmets. Other state associations may have similar rules; however, most support the helmet manufactures recommendations.

To help clarify for schools and organizations experiencing warning labels separating from football helmets reconditioned in 2024:

The loss of a mandatory label that might occur after the helmet has been properly recertified and returned to the customer does not void the certification or recertification. Helmets with warning label issues DO NOT need to be removed from play. If during inspection of helmets in your inventory an exterior warning label is missing, you should determine if your helmets are current with manufacturer recommended intervals for recertification. If so, the helmets will still meet NOCSAE and manufacturer recertification guidelines for on field play. Please reach out to your reconditioning representative for instructions to replace the missing label.

Please make certain your school or organization is using a reconditioning company licensed by NOCSAE. ${\ensuremath{\bullet}}$

from the 51 NFHS member state associations, which includes the District of Columbia. It is significant to note the participation figures collected from each state association are a cumulative total for each sport throughout the school year; therefore, multi-sport athletes are counted in the figures multiple times, once for each sport of participation.

The 2023-24 total marked the second consecutive increase after numbers tumbled during the pandemic. Since the initial survey after the pandemic, participation in high school sports has increased 444,248 in two years and represents a turnaround from the decline that started the year before the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We are thrilled to learn that participation in high school sports has exceeded eight million for the first time," said Dr. Karissa Niehoff, CEO of the NFHS. "The comeback from the pause of school sports during the pandemic has been so gratifying and certainly indicates the staying power of education-based sports in our nation's schools. We salute coaches, athletic directors and other school administrators for making these experiences happen for student-athletes."

Two of the biggest storylines are the increases in all forms of high school football – boys and girls – and the continued rise in both girls and boys wrestling. Eleven-player football remained the most popular boys sport and registered an increase for the second consecutive year from 1,028,761 to 1,031,508. There also was an increase in 8-player football participation from 23,812 to 26,420.

The biggest gains in football, however, came on the girls side, particularly with the emerging sport of flag football. The number of participants in girls flag football more than doubled from 2022-23 to 2023-24. A total of 42,955 girls participated in flag football in 2023-24 compared to 20,875 the previous year – a 105 percent increase. And from the 15,716 participants in 2021-22, there has been an increase of 173 percent. There also was an increase in the number of girls competing on 11-player football teams from 3,654 to 4,094.

Including boys and girls competitors in 6-, 8-, 9and 11-player football, and girls and boys participants in flag football, the overall football total for 2023-24 was 1,118,705 – an increase of 28,825 from 2022-23.

Another highlight is the sizeable jump in wrestling – boys and girls – for the second consecutive year. An additional 32,443 boys were involved in wrestling last year, jumping from 259,431 to 291,874. Since the 2021-22 season, there has been a gain of 60,000 in boys wrestling – an amazing 25 percent increase. And participation on girls teams has continued its historic rise as well with 64,257 participants last year – an increase of 102 percent from the 31,654 in 2021-22.

Outdoor track and field, volleyball and soccer all registered increases and remained the top three participatory sports for girls. Track and field increased four percent to 506,015, followed by volleyball at 479,125 and soccer at 383,895. Although the number of participants was down about 6,000, basketball (367,284) remained in the No. 4 spot followed by fast-pitch softball (345,451), tennis (195,766), cross country (192,989), competitive spirit (181,023 – up 20 percent), swimming and diving (138,174) and lacrosse (101,204).

Outdoor track and field, and soccer had significant gains on the boys side as well. After 11-player football and outdoor track and field (625,333), the rest of the boys top 10 includes basketball (536,668), baseball (471,701), soccer (467,483), wrestling (291,874), cross country (239,381), tennis (157,835), golf (155,174) and swimming and diving (116,799).

The NFHS High School Athletics Participation Survey was started in 1971 and was compiled in its current form through the 2018-19 school year, resuming annually with the 2021-22 survey. 2024-25 NFHS Basketball Rules Changes

- **1-19:** Limits the use of electronic devices used during a game for the purposes of recording and tracking stats, reviewing or diagramming plays, or other similar contest related functions.
- **Rationale:** Clarifies the type of electronic devices that are allowed during the game, prohibiting the use of voice and video recording devices worn during a contest.
- 2-11-11: Requires the non-official scorer(s) to compare records with the official scorer when multiple scorers are present.
- Rationale: Allows the official scorer to remain focused on game activity and places the responsibility of comparing scoring and other bookkeeping information on the auxiliary scorer(s).
- **3-3-6:** Requires a player who has been injured to be removed from the game if the coach is beckoned by the official, whether the coach enters the playing area or not, or if bench personnel (i.e., a coach or athletic trainer) enters the court without being beckoned. The coach may still use a time-out to continue assessment of the injury and keep the injured player in the game.
- **Rationale:** Creates consistency for officials that an injured player is subject to removal from the game when an injury occurs, and the coach/team personnel are beckoned or if they enter the court without an official beckoning.
- **3-3-7:** Allows 20 seconds for a player to address any minor blood on the body or uniform without leaving the game. If the blood cannot be appropriately covered/cleaned within 20 seconds, the head coach may take a time-out to address the issue or substitute for the player.
- **Rationale:** Provides a short interval of time to handle a blood related issue without delaying the game, while still addressing the health-related concerns associated with blood on a player.
- 3-4-4a (NEW): Allows the use of a school logo/mascot image to be centered directly above the uniform number in place of an identifying name.
- **Rationale:** Removes the restriction of allowing only lettering on the front of the jersey.
- 4-6-1 EXCEPTION (NEW): Creates an exception to basket interference by allowing a player(s) to touch only the net while the ball is on or within the basket provided that the contact did not affect the ball.
- Rationale: Allows play to continue unless the contact of the net affects the try for goal.
- **4-47-5 (NEW), 10-2-1g (NEW), 10-4-5b:** Changes the penalty for failing to immediately pass the ball to the nearer official when a whistle sounds from a player technical to a warning for delay for the first violation and a team technical for any subsequent offense.
- **Rationale:** Allows officials to issue a warning before assessing a technical and the technical will now be assessed to the team and not the player, lessening the severity of the penalty while addressing the behavior.
- **4-49 (NEW), 10-2-1g (NEW), 10-4-6f:** Changes the penalty for faking being fouled from a player technical to a warning for the first violation and a team technical for any subsequent offense and adds a definition and examples.

Rationale: Allows officials to issue a warning before

assessing a technical and the technical will now be assessed to the team and not the player, lessening the severity of the penalty while addressing the behavior.

- 7-1-1: Establishes that a player is out of bounds if contact by a teammate or other bench personnel outside the boundary line provides an advantage, allowing the player to remain in bounds.

game will start with a jump ball and the head coach does not lose the privilege of the coaching box.

- **Rationale:** Clarifies that an equal number of technical fouls committed by both teams during pregame offset and establishes how the game will start after offsetting technical fouls.
- **10-2-7 (NEW), 10-5-1i:** Changes the penalty for dunking or attempting to dunk or stuff a dead ball from a bench technical to a team technical.
- **Rationale:** Continues to penalize the offending team with a team technical foul (free-throws, offended team the ball to start the period, a foul added to the team count), but no longer requires the coach to lose the coaching box to start the game and no personal foul is awarded.

2024-25 Wrestling Points of Emphasis

NFHS Wrestling Rules Book 2024-25

The NFHS Wrestling Rules Committee and the NFHS Board of Directors believes there are areas of interscholastic wrestling that need to be addressed and given special attention. These areas of concern are often cyclical, some areas need more attention than others, and that is why they might appear in the rules book for consecutive editions. These concerns are identified as "Points of Emphasis." For the 2024-25 high school wrestling season, attention is being called to: Stalling and Stalemate, Dangerous Maneuvers and Holds, Proper Terms: Default, Medical Forfeit, Forfeit, Referee's Duties and Imminent Scoring. When a topic is included in the Points of Emphasis, these topics are important enough to reinforce throughout the academic year because they are not being given the proper attention needed.

Stalling and Stalemate

The act of stalling is an intentional act(s) of avoiding aggressive wrestling. The emphasis of stalling is reinforced by the numerous rules and assignment of its own penalty chart to penalize inactive behavior by a wrestler. The referee warns the offending wrestler(s) and if continued, subsequent penalties are invoked. However, a stalemate is considerably different.

Both wrestlers are aggressively wrestling and are interlocked in a position other than a pinning scenario, in which neither can improve their respective position(s). The referee stops the match and wrestling shall resume from the center of the mat.

Dangerous Maneuvers and Holds

In the purest form of wrestling, two similarsized athletes use their strength, guile, ability and repertoire of moves to control and dominate their opponent. NFHS rules have always made moves and maneuvers that intentionally injure or punish a wrestler illegal, and work on removing them from our sport. Some moves, maneuvers and holds are starting to filter down to our level from other influences that are not education-based athletics. The NFHS disapproves of any move, maneuver or hold that intentionally injures limbs, joints, penetrates any body cavities or renders a wrestler unconscious. Allowing those techniques to infiltrate into our sport is irresponsible, dangerous and in certain jurisdictions illegal.

No one wants to drive any students out of the sport. If parents are not confident that their children are in a well-managed risk environment, then they will not let them participate. That would be devastating to a sport that we have already seen a trend of declining participation numbers. We need to do everything possible in our schools to attract more students and retain them in our programs. Eliminating questionable moves, maneuvers and holds is the first place to start. Regardless of your role as either coach or referee, you must work together to keep certain techniques out of our sport.

Wrestling is one of the oldest sports in the world. The benefits of participating are phenomenal in developing high school students to better understand their bodies, appreciate discipline, be self-reliant and develop toughness that will be a life skill that they will use their entire lives. Let us direct our attention to preserving our sport for many more generations to come.

Proper Terms: Default, Forfeit, Medical Forfeit

In the purest and simplest form, a default is awarded when a wrestler is unable to continue wrestling for any reason. The match has started and they cannot continue to wrestle anywhere during the match. The opponent wins and the defaulting wrestler receives the loss.

A forfeit is when an opponent fails to appear for a match for any reason. Their opponent shall be present in a legal uniform on the mat, ready to wrestle. The forfeiting wrestler takes a loss on their record and is out of competition. With the introduction of the new category of Medical Forfeit, if the forfeiting wrestler cannot wrestle due to an injury or illness that occurred during the tournament. The wrestler remains in the tournament if possible (moving down to the consolation bracket) and does not take a loss on their record. This entire designation is determined by the tournament director after consultation with the on-site appropriate healthcare professional and the coach of the injured or ill contestant. All three actions cease wrestling for different reasons and have unique consequences.

Referee's Duties

The role of the referee is an integral part of the sport of wrestling. The essence of the sport is based upon the interpretation, judgment and execution of the rules. The referee has the authority to make rulings based upon their high school experience and mastery of the NFHS Wrestling Rules. Besides rule expertise, the referee has other important duties to ensure that all participants have a fair opportunity to compete in a space that limits their physical risks. In addition to skin checks and grooming, reviews with scorers and timekeepers, checking the legality of special equipment, uniforms, pads and taping, the referee is responsible for making sure the mat, mat areas and their markings are compliant with the rules. The referee conducts an inspection by walking around the area and visually making sure that the facility is in a reasonably safe condition. The referee is the protector of the competitors from rule compliant uniforms, equipment to appropriate mats. The role of the referee is unique and extremely valuable for all the participants, coaches and supporters.

Imminent Scoring

Imminent scoring is typically referred to a situation where one wrestler is on the verge of scoring point(s). This is because either one of the wrestlers is in a position to score a takedown, reversal, escape or near-fall, all available methods to scoring points in a wrestling match. The term "imminent" implies that the scoring opportunity is immediate or very close to happening. The term is often used by coaches and participants to describe a crucial moment in a match where a wrestler has a clear opportunity to score points and take control of a match.

Wrestling Comments on the 2024-25 Rules Changes

Modified an optional 10-foot circle in the center of the mat (2-1-3, 2-1-4, 5-24-1, 6-5-1, 6-6-6, 7-6-1) – The starting lines of a mat indicate the center of the mat and the 10-foot circle shall be optional. Wrestlers and officials know where the center of the mat is located without the benefit of the 10-foot circle. The optional choice would allow for larger designs of school logos or school mascots.

Modified that only one point of contact by either wrestler meets the requirement of being inbounds (5-10, 5-15-1, 5-15-2b, 5-15-2c, 5-15NFHS Wrestling Rules Book 2024-25

3, 5-18, 5-22-1, 5-22-2, 5-25-1, 5-25-3, 6-4-1) – This change safely eliminates the subjectivity of what is out of bounds. Referees are able to call out of bounds more consistently and accurately, as well as assisting wrestlers, coaches and spectators in better understanding out of bounds.

Modified the scoring of near-fall points (5-11-2g, 5-11-2h, 5-11-3, 9-1-5, Scoring Symbols) – This rule change simplifies the points awarded based on how long the wrestler is held in near-fall criteria.

Modified the points for a takedown (9-1-2,

Summary of Scoring, Scoring Symbols) – Promotes more scoring when wrestlers are in the neutral position.

Clarified how a Technical Fall is scored (5-11-4) – This change will clarify when the technical fall has concluded in relation to the near-fall criteria being met. The offensive wrestler cannot be penalized appropriately after the technical fall has been earned.

Created a new Official's Signal (5-28-4, Official Wrestling Signals) – Created a new signal for the referee's time-out. ●

Advisory Committee supports a strong position on the use of steroids, recommending that a student who has been found to use them be ineligible for a minimum of one year and not reinstated without testing to make sure the athlete has ceased using them." (Otte, 439) The rule change applied the code of conduct minimum to performance enhancing substances.

The WIAA, by Board of Control action as recommended by the Medical Advisory Committee, made a significant health move that was instituted at the beginning of the 1993-94 school year. Called the "day of rest" rule, it required teams in all sports to "rest from all physical activity for at least one calendar day after six consecutive days of practice or competition." (Otte, 440)

In 1995, the SMAC adopted the wrestling skin form to be utilized when a contagious skin condition may exist. The examination must be done no more than three days prior to wrestling and furnished at weigh-ins.

The Committee began the discussion of Female Osteoporosis concerns in 2008 and later developed the Female Triad guidelines in 2010. Female Triad was officially described as a syndrome of: disordered eating, lack of menstrual cycles, and osteoporosis in females. In addition, the SMAC identified concerns with Sickle Cell Trait.

In 2011, the SMAC worked with legislators to develop concussion legislation. As the concussion

legislation was passed, the Committee worked with the Wisconsin Department of Instruction to provide educational materials for member schools and other youth athletic organizations.

The SMAC worked with the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association to develop an acclimatization plan in 2012 and a policy was implemented for the 2014 season. The SMAC also discussed playeron-player contact. Player-on-player contact was limited beginning in the fall of 2014 to no contact the first week, 75 minutes the second week, and 60 minutes for the rest of the season. The plan was later adopted by the NFHS as a recommendation.

The Committee discussed transgender participation and eligibility in 2013. After reviewing the NCAA policy and several state associations' models, the SMAC made a recommendation to the Board of Control for adoption in June of 2013.

After discussions in 2004, 2007, and 2010, the SMAC prepared guidelines for sudden cardiac arrest to member schools in 2013. The Committee adopted the Anyone Can Save A Life emergency action plan for member schools and the NFHS Foundation provided a copy to be distributed to all WIAA member schools in 2015.

The Present

The SMAC began discussions in May of 2015 regarding baseball pitcher arm care. A study conducted on Tommy John surgeries from 2007-2011 stated that 57% of 790 surgeries during that time period were on adolescents in the 15-19 year-old age group. A pitch count was adopted with input of the Wisconsin Baseball Coaches Association in May 2016 for implementation in the spring of 2017.

At the May 2016 meeting, the SMAC adopted a change from the wrestling half-pound per day weight loss to the 1.5 percent per week weight loss plan based on the recommendation of the Minimum Weight Committee. The 1.5% weight loss program provides an individualized weight loss plan for every wrestler based on their skinfold measurement.

In addition, the SMAC adopted guidelines for Relative Energy Deficit in Sport (RED-S) to emphasize the condition effects all athletes; not just females. Due to the energy deficiency in RED-S normal body functioning is impaired and can affect metabolic rate, immunity, cardiovascular health, protein synthesis, as well as menstrual function, and bone health.

In May of 2017, the SMAC updated the concussion information, absorbed the Female Triad information into the Disordered Eating/RED-S information, and added mental health/wellness.

May of 2019, the SMAC discussed sport specific requests and began a process to update the WIAA Medical Policies and Procedures.

Throughout the spring and fall of 2020, the SMAC provided guidance and advice pertaining to the Coronavirus pandemic. Beginning with the season ending of winter sports through the cancellation of spring sports, Covid-19 (as it was designated), began a new chapter in WIAA member schools and their offerings of athletic programs. During June 2020, the SMAC began working on guidelines to mitigate risk for summer contact and the WIAA staff began recommendations of sport specific guidelines.

By July 1, 2020, the SMAC had recommended summer contact guidance in an effort for schools to conduct coaching contact during the summer and to prepare for the possible resumption of sports in the fall. In addition, work began on the Return to Fall Sports considerations. Winter considerations were developed in October and work began on the Spring recommendations.

In addition to the Covid-19 work, the SMAC also provided a recommendation restricting CBD usage by athletes to prescription by a licensed health care provider.

During the summer of 2023, the SMAC conducted a thorough revision of the Medical Policies and Procedures manual, with the addition of Emergency Action Planning information as well as Air Quality guidelines. The updated guide is available in a digital format only, on the WIAA website under Health.

Most recently, the SMAC recommended a Pre-Event Emergency Action Plan Meeting to be conducted for game management, officials, coaches and attending medical personnel for all athletic events. This recommendation was approved by the Board of Control and implemented the fall of 2024. ●

out of bounds. This is the same as with the scorer's table and any other equipment that is not part of the actual mat itself.

Uniforms

Uniforms must be school issued and meet the requirements as outlined in the NFHS rule book under Rule 4 Section 1. All wrestlers must wear an appropriate undergarment that completely covers the buttocks and groin area. In addition, Female wrestlers must also wear a sports bra that completely covers their breasts and minimizes the risk for exposure. If this combination of a legal singlet and a sports bra does not meet that criteria, the wrestler may be required to wear a form fitted compression shirt to satisfy this requirement. Coaches, please make sure that all of your wrestlers are legally equipped and that you are carrying extra uniforms and accessories to ensure that all of your wrestlers meet the criteria for a legal uniform.

Website

It is very important that all officials visit the website frequently throughout the season to keep up to date on interpretations, situations and answers to a variety of questions. This is the best way we can communicate and keep everyone on the same page. Also, check out the great variety of available resources and see if anything new has been added. Neck Laceration Protectors Mandated in High School Ice Hockey

All high school ice hockey players will now be required to wear a neck laceration protector – in its original manufactured state and as intended by the manufacturer – during competition.

This landmark new rule, along with four additional rules alterations, was proposed by the NFHS Ice Hockey Rules Committee as a product of its annual rules meeting held April 22-23 at The Alexander hotel in Indianapolis. All five rules changes were accepted by the NFHS Board of Directors and are effective with the 2024-25 season.

"The committee has done such great work the past several years, which has the rules in a really good place," said Dan Schuster, NFHS director of educational services and liaison to the Ice Hockey Rules Committee. "After great discussion again this year, the committee made some changes that will help minimize risk for participating players and also add some clarity to the current language within the rules book."

Mandating neck laceration protectors, which is detailed in the new Rule 3-4-4 in the NFHS Ice Hockey Rules Book, furthers the NFHS' commitment to risk minimization and the health and safety of participants and aligns the national rules with the measures taken by many state high school associations and youth hockey leagues across the United States.

Should a player enter a contest without a neck laceration protector, or if it comes off during play, the player will be directed to the bench and may return to the ice once the apparatus has been properly affixed. In the event the player refuses to wear the equipment, play will be stopped, and the player will be assessed a two-minute minor penalty.

Corresponding changes were made to Rules 3-3-1 and 3-3-5 outlining proper neck laceration protector protocols for goalkeepers. In addition to requiring the new item, Rule 3-3-1 states that the neck laceration protector must be worn underneath and separate from the "flapper-style" throat protector attached to the bottom of the goalkeeper's mask. Any modifications made to the piece of equipment will bring about a minor penalty. In Rule 3-3-5, which specifically addresses goalkeepers, the neck laceration protector is now included as a piece of "broken or displaced" equipment that will immediately result in a stoppage of play.

Clarifying the difference between "control" and "possession" of the puck was also a major priority for the NFHS Ice Hockey Rules Committee this year and is reflected in the new Rules 9-4-5 and 9-4-6. The following definitions were discussed by the committee over the course of multiple rules meetings and are being added to the rules book to correct any inconsistencies in their previous usage.

"Control" is defined in Rule 9-4-5 as: "Control of the puck is the act of propelling the puck with the stick, hand or feet. Control of the puck is not lost when contact with the puck is made by an opponent, the boards or the net, provided the player in control of the puck continues propelling the puck."

The definition of "possession" laid out in Rule 9-4-6 reads as follows: "The last player to physically touch the puck with the stick or body shall be considered in possession of the puck. NOTE: A player can have possession of the puck without control but cannot have control of the puck without possession."

According to the 2022-23 NFHS High School Athletics Participation Survey, 33,013 boys participate in ice hockey in 1,601 high schools across the country, and 8,601 girls play ice hockey in 713 schools. ●

WIAA & NFHS Partner to Equip High Schools with Life-Saving AEDs

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) is proud to announce an initiative aimed at enhancing the safety and well-being of student-athletes, coaches and spectators across the state.

The WIAA distributed Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) to 24high schools throughout Wisconsin, in partnership with the National Federation of State High School Associations Foundation. The remaining 10 were distributed using the Department of Public Instruction Free & Reduced lunch data.

The distribution of AEDs is a significant step towards creating a safer environment for high school sports in Wisconsin. The WIAA requires all paid head coaches to be AED and first aid cer-

tified, and all WIAA member schools are required to have an emergency action plan. The WIAA and its partners are committed to continuing their efforts to protect the health and well-being of student-athletes, coaches, and spectators.

Committee Works Toward Tackling Coach Contact Discussion

It's not overstating the fact that the membership's rules for coaches' contact with student-athletes outside their respective sport season has been widely misunderstood or wily circumvented for years.

The 2022 Area Meetings revealed what many in the membership already knew. Coaching contact needed to be addressed to avoid widespread violations in the future. It was telling when the executive staff described how non-school programs may essentially be a "school program in disguise," and those in attendance shared their concern about existing practices or remained curiously silent.

The concern is that coaches are coordinating the non-school programs to conduct team activities throughout the summer beyond the sanctioned five days in the summertime. The interpretation of the summer contact rules requires an outside entity to be responsible for ALL coordination, planning and liability of the program. As a Litmus Test offered at the Area Meetings to determine school involvement, the question presented was who would be held responsible by parents if there was dissatisfaction of their child's playing time or if there was a serious injury?

Whether the discussion has focused on the summertime or outside the season during the school year, the debate about the pros and cons of school coach contact with student-athletes they coach has been persistent for many years.

The origin of the restrictions for coaches working with student-athletes reflected the concerns of school administrators regarding specialization. They believed, as many do today, that student-athletes participating in multiple sports is preferred and beneficial to avoid burnout and injuries caused by overuse specific to respective sports. Another factor in limiting coaches working with student-athletes outside their respective sports seasons was to enhance loyalty and commitment to the sport program that is in-season. This sentiment addressed concerns from both a physical and educational perspective.

Through time, the discussions have shifted a bit from their origins. More recently, the sentiment of school administrators has focused on competitiveness and opportunities for student-athletes to enhance their skill development. It has been conveyed that students in heavier populated areas have greater access to resources for training and participation in non-school sports programs than others in lesser populated areas. Or, these non-school opportunities come at a cost that are not affordable for many.

In addition, it is the contention of a segment of school coaches and administra-

tors that non-school programs may be detrimental to the education-based, team philosophy and the adherence of sound training principles. Therefore, it would be universally advantageous for school coaches to be the resource for the progress and development of student-athletes in school programs.

All the concerns and confusion surrounding coaching contact has brought us to where we are today. The Board passed a directive in December 2023 to establish an ad hoc committee to examine season lengths, game maximums and coach contact. The Calendar & Contact Committee formed earlier this year and met for the first time in April, which resulted in development of its purpose statement. At its July 23 meeting, the committee targeted summer coaching contact days as the first priority among the topics to be addressed.

Since that time, the committee has met numerous times and has conducted research involving other state associations. In addition, a statewide coaching-contact survey for student-athletics, coaches, administrators and parents was created and distributed to gather information and data through anonymous feedback. The purpose of the survey was to evaluate the needs of stakeholders and to guide the discussions for possible solutions.

The survey garnered 17,166 responses. More than 40 percent of the surveys represented student-athletes and almost 46 percent of respondents were submitted by parents or guardians. School administrators and coaches accounted for 14 percent of the respondents. Complete results of the survey will be posted on the WIAA website.

Informed with the data presented on the survey, the Calendar and Contact Committee will continue processing the information to continue its commitment and dedication to serving the membership's interests.

Any recommendations by the committee will be shared with the Board of Control to determine if an amendment will be advanced to the Annual Meeting for a membership vote in April. If the review process extends beyond the deadline for advancing to the Annual Meeting, any amendments will be placed on the Annual Meeting agenda in 2026.

Not to get too far ahead of things, this is only the first step in the committee's study of interrelated topics. Still to come will be its review of season lengths and game maximums. The membership extends its appreciation to the efforts of the Calendar & Coach Committee. \bullet

Wisconsin Conference dissolved. In girls golf, Kiel will enter the Glacier Trails Conference after competing as an independent.

In other action items, the Board approved the 2025-26 and 2026-27 fall sports co-ops, which includes 167 programs. The 14 new co-ops for 2025-26 are Providence Academy (Green Bay)/Green Bay N.E.W. Lutheran in boys and girls cross country; Clayton/Prairie Farm in girls golf; Ashland/Drummond, New Holstein/Brillion and Wilmot Union/Catholic Central in boys soccer; Portage/Poynette in girls swimming & diving; and University Lake School/Lake Country Classical Academy in girls volleyball. The Board also approved the 2026-27 and 2027-28 football-only co-ops, including Ithaca/Weston, Kenosha Bradford/Reuther Central, Ozaukee/Random Lake and Randolph/Cambria Friesland in 11-player football; and Clayton/Prairie Farm and Mellen/Butternut/Mercer in 8-player football.

Among the discussions with the Board were a review of the 2024 Area Meetings, including feedback on the Google polls to identify potential assets that would currently benefit members, an inquiry to identify school assistance that can be derived from a WIAA Foundation, determine any ongoing concerns with proposed Name, Image and Likeness language, and an addition of a checklist resource for schools in determining whether or not to submit a Residence and Transfer Waiver Request.

The Board was introduced to several possible Constitutional amendments that will be reviewed to determine if they will be advanced to the membership for a vote at the Annual Meeting. Amendments under consideration pertain to maximum contests for ninth graders, the future status of the middle school membership, requirement for ejected fans to complete a free online sportsmanship course before attending a home contest, and updated Name, Image and Likeness language, as well as an editorial item addressing the timeline for membership elections. A final

ship, transfer waiver process, electronic seeding, school video streaming, and a Score Center review. In addition, the executive staff responded to Open Forum topics that were submitted prior to the meeting.

The two topics that were introduced at multiple meetings were the basketball shot clock and 8-player football playoff expansion. Furthermore, a number of in-person surveys were conducted to receive input from the membership of various questions using QR codes.

Twenty-seven schools were recognized as winners of the 2023-24 Award of Excellence, and the meetings concluded with an electronic spin of a wheel that randomly selected two member schools in attendance at their respective meeting to each receive a free AED. This was part of a large initiative to distribute 24 AEDs to members.
